t is my pleasure to welcome you to our 2025 Annual Investors Meeting. Gathering at the historic Tower Theatre feels fitting, as this year has been about Fresno County taking center stage— showcasing the investments, partnerships and momentum that are moving our economy forward.

2025 has been a pivotal year for the Fresno County EDC. Guided by a "back-to-basics" approach, our team has focused on the fundamentals of economic development: providing white-glove service to businesses evaluating Fresno County as a strategic location while ensuring our existing employers have the resources they need to thrive. Just as four base hits equal a run, our work this year has been steady and impactful—building momentum one win at a time.

One of our most important undertakings was completing the County of Fresno's Five-Year Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy in partnership with the U.S. Economic Development Administration. Over 15 months, hundreds of voices—including employers, educators, community organizations and residents—helped shape a plan that is actionable, adaptable and designed to guide real investments. This CEDS not only reflects the county's priorities but also directly informed our new three-year strategic plan at the EDC.

We also celebrated milestones that signal the strength and resilience of our local economy. We broke ground on Scannell Properties' \$100 million Westgate Industrial Center, a transformative project that validates Fresno County's market potential and is already attracting new investment interest. At the same time, we launched the region's first FAME (Federation for Advanced Manufacturing Education) chapter west of the Rockies, a nationally recognized program preparing the skilled workforce advanced industries demand.

That commitment to industry-aligned workforce has gained attention far beyond our region. U.S. Secretary of Labor Lori Chavez-DeRemer visited Clovis this year to see firsthand how proof-of-concept initiatives here are becoming best-in-class models for the nation. Her visit underscored what we already know—that Fresno County is not only competing for investment but also building the talent pipelines to sustain it.

We continued to deliver events and platforms that set the tone for industry in the Valley. Our 20th Annual Real Estate Forecast drew record participation and provided timely insights on issues from insurance challenges to rising utility costs. For the first time, we welcomed PG&E CEO Patti Poppe for a fireside chat with City of Fresno Mayor Jerry Dyer, underscoring the importance of candid dialogue between energy leaders, local government and the business community.

This year also prompted us to reflect on our own path forward. In strategic planning sessions, we sharpened our mission to "Champion economic growth for Fresno County" and refined our vision to "Envision a Fresno County where economic opportunities are accessible to all businesses, workers and residents." These guiding statements capture who we are today and who we aspire to be in the future.

None of this happens without the talented and dedicated team at the Fresno EDC. From our longest-tenured staff to our newest colleagues, they have shown creativity, resilience and commitment in navigating the push and pull of economic development. I am grateful for their steady leadership and for the trust and partnership of our investors, businesses and community partners.

As we look ahead, this year has reinforced that Fresno County's story is ready to be told on a bigger stage. And as we gather here at Tower Theatre, with its lights shining bright, it is fitting to remember that our role is not to take center stage for ourselves, but for the businesses, workers and communities we serve. Together, we are ready for what comes next.

Fresno County EDC's UPDATED mission statement is to champion economic growth for Fresno County.

Adopted unanimously by the Board on July 22, 2025, the updated mission reflects a shift from simply "marketing" the county to actively championing its growth through business attraction and retention, workforce development, regional advocacy, and inclusive economic advancement.

The Board also embraced a bold, unifying vision that aligns with strategic goals and aspires to the broader ambition for the region:

We envision a Fresno County where economic opportunities are accessible to all businesses, workers, and residents.

Giraffe Award



OK Produce was founded in downtown Fresno in 1950 by Charlie Matoian. Starting from humble beginnings with one single truck on a route to Coalinga, Charlie and his partners expanded to become a wholesaler of various fruits and vegetables with the promise of top quality and customer service. His son Matty started working at OK Produce at the age of 12 fixing lettuce boxes and joined the company after graduating from Fresno State. In 1979, Matty took over the leadership position and in 1986 led the company through a large expansion to a new facility. Matty's sons Chad and Brady joined the company in 1998 and 2000 respectively and lead the company into the third generation upon Matty retiring in 2008. In 2017, OK Produce completed the construction of a new facility as a result of their long-time facility being acquired by the high-speed rail. As with the 2 prior generational expansions, OK Produce decided to stay close to their roots in downtown Fresno, very near to where the facility was founded.

Today, OK Produce delivers in a fleet of over 150 trucks to 1500 retail grocery stores throughout California from border to border and into Oregon and Nevada. With a vast product list of over 1600 different fresh fruits and vegetables, OK Produce represents some of the most respected brands in the produce industry with a continued dedication to high-quality, top-notch service and extreme value. Today the company also has become one of the largest specialized ripening company in the produce industry and each week ripens approximately 100 truckloads of bananas, papayas, tomatoes, avocados and mangoes. In total, OK Produce is operational 7 days a week, 24 hours a day and daily handles 100-120 truckloads of fresh healthy fruits and vegetables and delivers to every county in California 363 days per year.

Sustainability is very important to the company With a goal to deliver the most healthy food in the most healthy way, OK Produce has led the way by embracing green technology very early and often. Starting in 2001 with the installation of one of the first and largest privately owned solar power systems, the company has continued to be committed to the planet Earth in all ways possible. Today the new facility is powered by 5 megawatts/14000 panels of solar power, and this year will be breaking ground on an additional 2 megawatts of solar. In 2020, OK Produce started the process to transition their fleet to zero emission electric semi-trucks.

The current fleet includes 19 electric semi-trucks, 3 electric yard trucks and 22 electric passenger vehicles. In partnership with the City of Fresno, San Joaquin Valley Air Pollution District, PG and E, CARB, CEC and Pacific Solar, OK Produce is expanding their electric fleet with the addition of 61 solar powered zero emission electric vehicles and 25 solar powered emissions free electric refrigerated trailers over the next 18 months.

Teamwork is key to the success of OK Produce and their partner vendors and customers. Today the OK Produce team is made up of 600 hardworking and extremely talented team members all working together to provide the most healthy, fresh and delicious fruits and vegetables to families throughout the service area. The company takes pride is the fact that we help feed families throughout the state with the hope that fresh fruits and vegetables become a foundational aspect of healthy living especially for kids and future generations.

Charles and Ann Matoian made it very clear that the community was great to our family and company. They therefore started the family tradition of giving back to the community. Matty Matoian has carried on that tradition with generous gifts to various foundations throughout Fresno including Community Medical Centers, Valley Children's Hospital, Fresno State and Break the Barriers.

On April 25, 2025, the Fresno County EDC hosted a Good Jobs Roundtable with U.S. Secretary of Labor, Lori Chavez-DeRemer and Congressman Vince Fong at Wawona Frozen Foods. The event, attended by key leaders from the Department of Labor, educational institutions, and founding members of the Federation for Advanced Manufacturing Education (FAME), highlighted the success and future of the Good Jobs program.

The meeting included an overview of the Fresno County EDC's Good Jobs Program, presentations on the manufacturing industry sector partnership, and a roundtable discussion with employers and partners. The conversation focused on how the grant addresses workforce challenges, aligns training programs with evolving industry needs, and plans for long-term sustainability and scalability.

SIGNING DAY AT REEDLEY COLLEGE, JULY 28, 2025

A FAME tradition where students sign commitments with sponsoring companies

Good Jobs Central Valley launched the first Federation for Advanced Manufacturing Education (FAME) Chapter west of the Rockies in October 2024, designating Reedley College as the FAME Technical Center. FAME is a global-best advanced manufacturing technician program with over 40 chapters operating in the United States. This expansion into California is a significant step for the region's manufacturing sector, combining a robust curriculum with on-the-job training and employer sponsorship to improve the local talent pipeline.

The program's inaugural cohort starts Fall 2025. By year two, the program will support two cohorts of 30-40 students who will attend classes two days a week and receive paid on-the-job training at their sponsoring employers for the other three days. During their pursuit of a FAME Advanced Manufacturing Technician associate's degree, each student will gain 1,800 hours of paid, hands-on work experience, with wages starting at \$21 per hour.

Momentum is already building, with 250,000 square feet committed, bringing new jobs and investment to the community.

Fast Trak is a women-owned and operated business in West Fresno. The EDC has worked with Fast Trak to support the growth and diversification of their company by facilitating the financing of their new LC5 Combination Laser along with securing PG&E's Economic Development Rate (EDR).

Estimated EDR Savings: \$130,000Capital Investment: \$1.5 million

Special Project Highlight CEDS

Fresno County Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy 2025-2030

In 2024, through a partnership with the County of Fresno and TIP Strategies, Fresno County EDC undertook a strategic initiative to create and update the 2025-2030 Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy for Fresno County.

Strategic Plan Vision Statement Objectives Fresno County is a place where **opportunity** is accesible to all, prosperity is shared, and a diversified economy supports Infrastructure Quality of Business resilient, thriving communities. What is a CEDS? A Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) is a locally-based, regionally-driven economic development planning process and document—a roadmap for the region's economic future.

Why does it matter? The previous County of Fresno CEDS (2016-2022) paved the way for several strategic initiatives that received unprecedented federal investments. Fresno County was the only region in the country to receive both Build Back Better and Good Jobs Challenge awards.

Alignment with a regional CEDS is required by municipalities, community organizations, and others as they pursue federal funding from the U.S. Economic Development Administration (EDA).

What did we do? We set out to create a CEDS that would do more than check the box. In addition to conducting an analysis of the region's current economic conditions, including its strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats (SWOT), we conducted robust stakeholder engagement and identified priorities for future investment & growth.

What's next? The Fresno County CEDS 2025-2030 was presented to the Fresno County Board of Supervisors for approval in August 2025 and was submitted to the EDA for approval immediately following. Fresno County EDC will continue convening the strategy committee and implementing the plan in the next five years!



Impact Study

Fresno County EDC's programmatic outcomes include capital investments and jobs created through our business attraction efforts, workforce training initiatives, and successful applications of regional and local incentives such as the PG&E Economic Development Rate (EDR), Fresno Façade Improvements Grant, and the SoCal Gas Grant.

The impact figures presented below reflect program activities from the 2024-2025 fiscal year.



These efforts led to the creation or retention of 419 jobs across the region, supporting over \$28.1 million in labor income and nearly \$48.4 million in GRP, resulting in a total annualized impact of nearly \$142.6 million.



LOCAL HIRING INCENTIVES:

New Employment Opportunities (NEO) Program:

Wage reimbursement is available to qualified employers hiring qualifying Fresno County residents.

- Weeks 1-13 of employment: 100% reimbursement.
- Weeks 14-26 of employment: 75% reimbursement.
- Extensions available for up to a full year of partial reimbursement.

Good Jobs Challenge:

The Good Jobs Central Valley initiative, supported by a \$23 million investment from the U.S. Economic Development Administration, aims to connect workers in Fresno, Madera, Kings, and Tulare counties to well-paying jobs in Business Services, Manufacturing, Transportation & Logistics, and Construction. By uniting businesses, educational institutions, and workforce training organizations, the initiative addresses skill gaps, increases job placement rates, and drives local economic growth. Good Jobs Central Valley bridges the gap between training and employment, offering programs that lead to well-paying jobs with benefits. Training programs are designed to offer a comprehensive approach to workforce development, while delivering tangible benefits to employers and the community alike. Here's how the program works:

- Employer-Driven Training tailored to industry needs.
- Access to Skilled Talent ready to meet business demands.
- Cost Savings on Hiring & Training.
- Improved Retention & Job Satisfaction with wraparound support.
- Regional Economic Growth contributing to long-term prosperity.

UTILITY INCENTIVES:

PG&E's Economic Development Rate: Qualifying businesses in Fresno County may receive up to a 20% enhanced rate reduction on their monthly electricity costs over a five-year period.

Delivered by PG&E, this program is designed for industrial, manufacturing, and processing businesses considering locating or expanding within California. If the business may have out-of-state options, is considering relocating to other states, or is at risk of closing their existing operations entirely, our staff are available to provide navigation and offer technical assistance on receiving this rate reduction.

STATE INCENTIVES:

California Competes Tax Credit: An income tax credit negotiated between the State and businesses that want to grow or relocate in California. Credit amount depends on several factors, including, but not limited to job creation, economic impact, and amount of investment in California from the business.

Fresno County businesses have been awarded approximately
 \$47.3 million in state tax credits in the lifetime of this program.

Manufacturing Equipment Sales & Use Tax Exemption: Partial sales and use tax exemption that applies to the sale, purchase, and lease of qualified tangible personal property.

- Eliminates 3.94% of California sales tax portion; local taxes still apply.
- Immediate benefit- exemption taken at time of purchase.

FEDERAL INCENTIVES:

Foreign Trade Zone (FTZ):

The FTZ Program is a federal program used to encourage value-added activity at U.S facilities in competition with foreign alternatives by allowing delayed or reduced duty payments on foreign merchandise, as well as other savings. Fresno County is part of FTZ No.226, which includes:

- Duty exemption.
- Duty deferral.
- Logistical benefits.
- Ad valorem tax exemption.
